Course Description: This course introduces students to the study of disease and ill health through their patterns of occurrence in human populations. The approaches of epidemiology in estimating the burden of disease, in making inferences about cause of disease, and in evaluating primary, secondary, and tertiary prevention strategies are presented.

B. COURSE COMPETENCIES

- a. Explain public health history, philosophy, and values.
- b. List major causes and trends of morbidity and mortality in the United States and New Jersey.
- c. Discuss the science of primary, secondary, and tertiary prevention in population health, including health promotion and screening.
- d. Explain the critical importance of evidence in advancing public health knowledge.
- e. Apply epidemiological methods to the breadth of settings and situations in public health practice
- f. Identify key sources of data for epidemiologic purposes, such as vital statistics and disease registries.
- g. Recognize specific features of different study designs and identify their respective strengths and weaknesses.

- e. List the main characteristics, advantages, and disadvantages of epidemiologic studies.
- f. Apply the criteria used to assess a causal association.
- g. Calculate appropriate epidemiologic measures based upon the study design.

2. **Quizzes:** Twelve quizzes will be given throughout the semester on Canvas. Quizzes are open-book/note and untimed but must be completed by the designated due date/time. The quizzes



are designed for students to maintain a rhythm with class work and for instructors to assess students understanding of class material. Except where noted otherwise, quizzes will be made available on Canvas after class each Tuesday and will be due before class the following week. Each quiz will have a total of 10 points and the lowest two quiz grades will be dropped. Late submission will result in $\underline{0}$ points.

3. Class Projects

Person, place, and time: COVID-19 Pandemic

The COVID-19 pandemic continues having major impacts on public health around the world. The extent of the effects vary widely by country since governments have handled the crisis differently. For this project, students will be organized in teams (assigned by the instructors) based on final fall registration. Each team will be assigned an individual country for which the team will assessed the impact of COVID-19 on their population. They will apply person, place and time concepts to describe the steps each country has taken to slow or stop the COVID-19 pandemic. Detailed instructions will be provided early in the semester. See Section D for due dates.

- 4. <u>Midterm and Final Examinations</u>: Exams will be taken during class time at the regularly assigned class time. Students will have the entire class time to complete the exams. Exam format will be detailed early in the semester. See Section D for exams dates.
- 5. Attendance & Participation: Students are expected to attend class in person on Tuesdays from 6:00pm-8:00pm, as well as complete up to 30-minutes of additional web-based activities. Active participation in both lecture and web-based activities is required. Participation should focus on quality versus quantity. For maximum points, students should do the following:
 - a. Maximize attendance
 - b. Lead or significantly contribute to discussions in class or through Canvas.
 - c. Complete class course mid- and final evaluations
- 6. Online 30 Participation: Every week there will be an Online 30 assignment posted on the Canvas website. The assignment will consist of reading an article or guidance document and posting thoughtful discussion points in the course forum. Examples include about what you found interesting/enlightening from the article, evaluation of methods/study design, or implications for future studies or guidance. Each student is expected to post or contribute to someone else's thread at least once before class each week.
