Course Description: This course will build skills in outcomes research operations pertaining to IRB requirements, project management, literature evaluation, reference management, and professionalism. Students will be prepared to transition these academic skill sets to independent professional practice. The course is designed to serve as a foundation to the MS-HOPE capstone project.

1. Ethical considerations in human subject research in biomedicine including IRB certification.

2. Work independently and as part of a team to conduct health outcomes and economics research (HEOR) projects.
3. Design, evaluate, interpret, and communicate the results of non-randomized, observational research for applications in health outcomes, health economics, and health policy research.
4. Synthesize evidence for health policy decision makers to facilitate translation of interventions, applications, or programs.

6. Understand research project management
